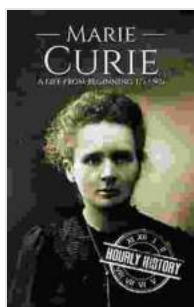

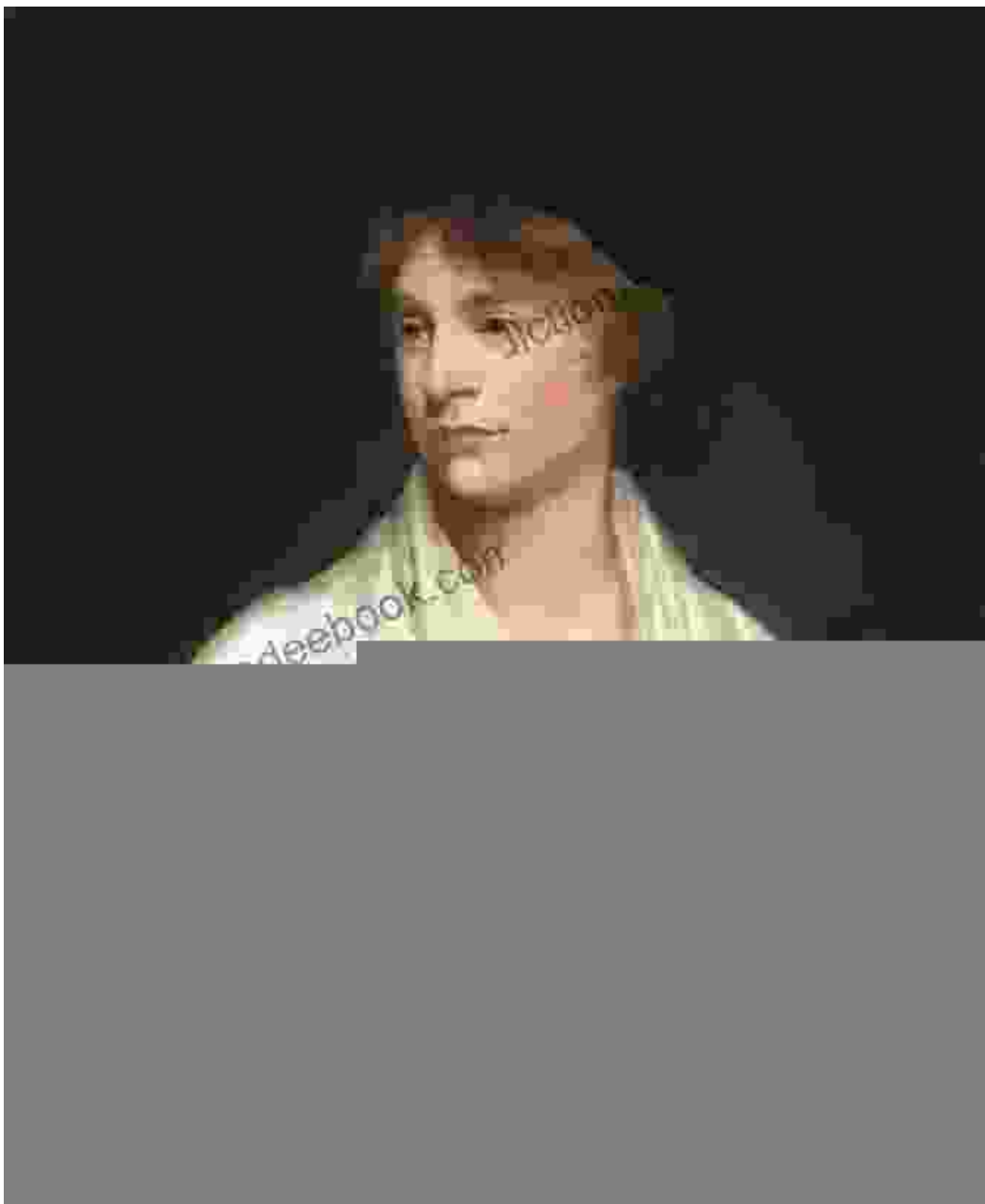
The Renaissance and Enlightenment

Rosa Parks (1913-2005)

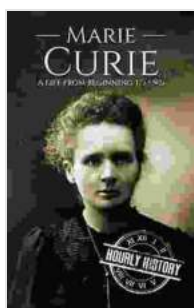


Rosa Parks, the civil rights activist
