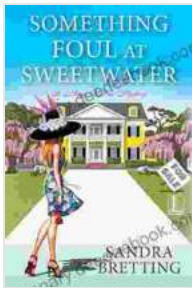


# Something Foul at Sweetwater: A Missy Dubois Mystery

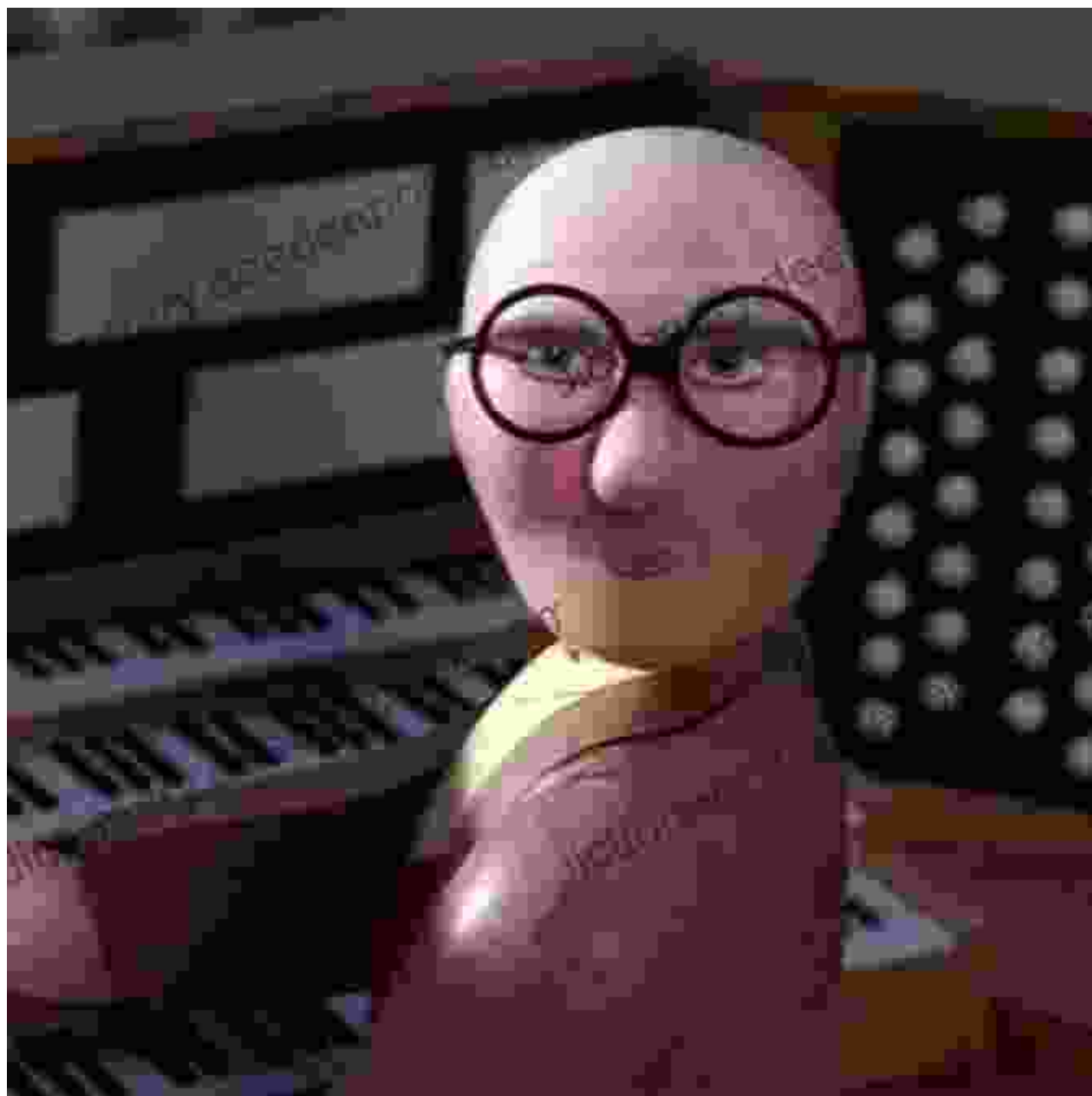
