



Rights of Woman", published in 1792, boldly challenged the prevailing notions of female inferiority and advocated for equal education, property rights, and political participation for women.




Section 2: Leaders of Independence


determination, and unwavering belief in the cause of abolition made her an iconic figure in the fight against slavery.



Section 3: Visionaries of Social Change


Mohandas Gandhi

Section 4: Rebels with a Cause


Rosa Parks




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
